




"The Times, They Are a Changing"

The title of this Bob Dylan song (a favorite when I was in high school) sums up the dilemma facing many of our Presbyterian churches. The times are changing and we don't know how to adapt. One of great strengths of Christian congregations is our ability to be a source of stability for people, but that

very strength can be a weakness when the world around us starts to change as rapidly as it has in the last few generations. God's gospel message is unchanging, but the ways in which we communicate it to others must adapt to a different social structure and the electronic communication revolution.

Your Session and I have been studying a very interesting and informative book published by the Alban Institute entitled "In Search of the Unchurched," by Alan C. Klaas. This book is the result of a study commissioned by the Lutherans to "conduct a major project that would set in motion forces to reverse the trend of declining membership." (introduction)

Klaas writes in the introduction, "The book has two primary messages. First, the most potent factor in declining membership is the change from a churched to an unchurched society. Second, the best hope for dealing with the changed society is the individual congregation." (p. viii)

He goes on to list seven transitions that have been happening that affect congregational ministry for Christ:

- \* We have shifted from a churched society to an unchurched society.
- \* People participate in congregations for different reasons. (many people who say they have faith do not participate in a congregation or go to worship)
- \* People have less loyalty to denominations.
- \* Congregations have different purposes. (ministry to current members, or reaching out?)
- \* The mission field has moved (from out there somewhere to our own communities)
- \* Different people do the mission work (move from professionals to members)

The main point that he makes in the book is that the solution to the problem of declining membership and commitment lies within the individual congregation and its perception of and attitude to ministry and the unchurched. Put simply, we might be contributing to the problem and we might have within us through the Holy Spirit the solution to the problem.

Klaas points out that our potential success as a congregation that communicates the good news to others hinges upon our attitude toward ministry, each other, and the many, many unchurched persons in our community. If we focus mostly on ourselves, the congregation has decided to die. If we put our focus on others outside of ourselves, we have decided to follow the Great Commission of Jesus to go out into the world with the message of salvation and reconciliation. As he writes, "When leaders and members pay substantial amounts of attention to reaching people who are not already members, the congregation moves beyond survival and begins to thrive." (p. 19)

Great Commission churches engage in mission activities and ministries which directly engage the persons they are trying to reach . . . examples are Vacation Bible School, our Oasis program, Presbyterian Women's clothing store.

These congregations have activities for members and activities designed to reach non-members on their calendars, and "doors" into engagement with the church other than just Sunday morning worship.

Here is a list of characteristics of outreach-oriented congregations found in Klaus' book:

- \* they are motivated to extend mission beyond current membership
- \* they seek local, contextual answers
- \* they meet people's needs, not the needs of the organizational structure
- \* they organize around mission, not structure
- \* they use member's gifts in new ministries
- \* they see clergy and laity as partners
- \* they value "mistakes"
- \* they care for people

Your Session has been studying this book carefully, and are currently reading and discussing about the nature of unchurched people and how we can reach out to them with the good news of Christ. The key to the success of their leadership is our congregation's willingness to learn and follow their suggestions.

Knowing who we are and what Christ calls us to be and do is the first step in being prepared to call a new pastor. Our Pastoral Nominating Committee, when it is formed in the spring, will need to know what experience and training your new pastor needs in order to partner with you in reaching out to the unchurched persons in this community. God calls both congregation and pastor to do this important work for the Kingdom.

After Easter, we will have a Gathering on the Future which will give the Session an opportunity to present the results of their learning and discussions and hear the dreams of our congregation for future ministry. This will be the last step in our Mission Study process that provides the information needed for the Pastoral Nominating Committee to write the position description for the pastoral search.

Your leaders have been working hard on your behalf so that our congregation might move beyond just trying to survive to a thriving, growing congregation passionate about ministry for Christ. This is our hope and our prayer. We invite you to pray for us and walk along with us on this journey . . .

## <u> March Library Corner</u>

Read any good books lately? I haven't heard from anyone this past month. I just read "Ordinary Grace" by William Kent Krueger. The story is about the summer of 1961 in

New Bremen, Minnesota. The Twins were playing their debut season, ice-cold root beers were selling out at the soda counter of Halderson's Drugstore, and Hot Stuff comic books were a mainstay on every barbershop magazine rack. It was a time of innocence and hope for a country with a new, young president. But, for thirteen-year-old Frank Drum, it was a grim summer in which death visited frequently and assumed many forms; accident, nature, suicide, and murder. Told from Frank's perspective forty years after that fateful summer, Ordinary Grace is a brilliantly moving account of a boy standing at the door of his young manhood, trying to understand a world that seems to be falling apart around him. We currently have pledges and contributions totaling 70,000 dollars for calendar year 2015. Historically, we also get 100 to 110 percent of that total. In January, our income was 7,477 dollars, while expenses were 7,548 dollars. I would say we started off the year very nicely.

I wanted to mention, also that March is Red Cross Month, and so the Red Cross Bloodmobile will be in Flora on March 5<sup>th</sup>, at the Flora Methodist Church from 11:30AM to 5:30PM.
